Must haves

Geography is usually required but is not compulsory at all universities. Physical geography courses, usually BSc, prefer at least one or two sciences. Human geography courses, usually BA, favour complementary subjects like economics, maths, history, politics, English or modern languages.

Geology, meteorology, geophysics, environmental geoscience, sociology, anthropology or a joint degree with a social science.

Example course modules

In the first year, most geography courses cover both physical and human aspects. After that you specialise. In physical geography, you might cover climatology, biogeography and soils, earth systems, global climate systems. In human geography you might cover global worlds, global challenges, environment & society, urbanisation, culture & modernity, historical cultural geographies.

Career prospects

Like a lot of sciences, around one in five graduates in physical geography go on to further study, mainly for one-year masters courses. In the world of work, graduates often go into environment and heritage work, but also to general jobs in areas like marketing, business analysis and management, as these are well-rounded degrees that help graduates get a range of useful skills. On the human and social geography side, there is a shortage of social science graduates with really good maths skills, and graduates from these disciplines who have them are in demand from modern industry. An ability to combine good data handling skills with good communication and social skills will really help start your career, and that's something a geography degree with a good stats component can really bring to the jobs market.
